A few years ago, **Harvey Mackay**, my favorite columnist wrote an article about things they don't teach you in school and in re-reading the article I discovered that what he said for students still applies to us as adults in all aspects of our lives and certainly as volunteers.

### His nine points were:

1. Develop, nurture relationships and keep networking. In the non-profit world this remains key. There are so many other organizations we can learn from and work with to help us maintain and sustain ourselves.
2. Find Advisers and mentors. Why reinvent the wheel if there is a tried and true way of doing things. Mentors can help show and teach us or engage us in the possibilities we may not have realized before. And, the bonus is we get to contribute to their success as well.
3. Set Goals. Yes, we need to be persistent, determined but first we have to have the vision or the goal to know where we want to go and how to get there.. Make them measurable, identifiable, specific, attainable and remember to write them down
4. Get along with people. Remember the old adage about catching more bees with honey than with vinegar.
5. Be happy. Greet challenges and look at them as opportunities. You will do your job better when you are.
6. Smile. One of the most powerful things that one can do to have influence over others is to smile at them.
7. Sense of humor. Not necessarily jokes but humor.

8. Be yourself. Be content to be yourself and with your talents and abilities. It will be much easier in the long run.

Volunteer. Yes, you are already doing that and doesn't make you have a healthier outlook on life. As a volunteer you are a go-getter and you make a difference in the life of someone else.

Our membership is all-volunteer and is dedicated to helping those within the community to a more meaningful life - putting commitment and caring into action. While Assistance League provides services for most age groups in the community, our focus is on the children... providing school uniforms, jackets, underwear and shoes to needy elementary school children through Operation School Bell.

The past few years, nearly 2,000 elementary school

children have been referred to Operation School Bell by school personnel. As well, needy junior high school students have also received needed clothing. Among other projects, Assistance League Anaheim serves visually impaired students and invites community senior citizens to a monthly luncheon and program at the service center on La Palma Avenue.

### Cool Caps

In addition, the Anaheim Hills Auxiliary provides Cool Caps for cancer patients receiving chemotherapy, hygiene kits for the elementary school children, and baskets of goodies for motel children. Members of the Iris Auxiliary prepare layettes for infants at Anaheim Regional Medical Center and Assault Survivor Kits for adult victims. They also purchase books for children visiting OSB for clothing. In December, 2,000 books were donated by Disneyland Resorts to help in this effort.

### Young Helpers

Also helping are two other Assistance League Auxiliaries: CYALT (College Young Adult Leadership Team) and Assisteens. Both groups participate in the annual fashion extravaganza as well as with other chapter and auxiliary events. CYALT members meet regularly via the computer as many are away at college. Some members may not be away at school but enjoy the camaraderie and volunteer work. Assisteens membership is open to boys and girls in grades 7 to 12. The aims of participation are to develop a sense of community responsibility, self-reliance, personal responsibility, poise, public speaking and leadership skills.

While proceeds from Assistance League Anaheim's Thrift Shop and annual fashion show/silent auction provide funds for these community service programs, grants from Change a Life Foundation and the Klein Family Foundation greatly assist in continuing this vital work.

### Carousel of Fashion fundraiser

This year's fundraising gala is "Carousel of Fashion" and is scheduled on Saturday, April 14, in the Grand Ballroom of the Disneyland Hotel. Leslie Kazarian is chairman and Carol Latham is coordinating the fashions. Sponsors, advertisers and underwriters are needed. The day begins at 10:30 a.m. with registration and silent auction. This year, Shirley McBurney will be recognized for her half-century in Assistance League Anaheim.
