Other awards went to: Brookhurst Junior High School for 'Character Building in Art' ('Tree of Knowledge' mural); Anaheim Presbyterian Church for 'Light and Remembrance in Art' in the stained glass windows and the beautifully carved Communion altar and pews; Harbor Lofts (by Anaheim Ice) for 'Wind Dynamics in Art' – Peter Shire's wind mobile sculptures; Founders Park for 'The Passage of Time in Art' - sundial. The prestigious Julie Mayer Award went to Colony Park for the water-scape and historical landscaping with the 'Anaheim Aquaculture in Art'. This award is named for past member Julie Mayer who was a visionary when it came to the arts (especially in Anaheim) and in 1988 started the first of the Art In Public Places Awards. In 1999 the Arts Council in Julie's memory initiated the Julie Mayer Award category to the AIPP program and each year since then the most outstanding nominee is awarded this special award.

Open for business and entirely member-supported since 1997, AAA Electra 99 has hosted thousands of artists and musicians; giving an open, judgement-free, "Any Art Accepted" forum to Orange County creatives. The down and dirty DIY aesthetic and undesirable dump-adjacent location lend to the underground street cred. that the gallery has so reluctantly earned. Part folk-lore, part absurdist performance piece, part pop-culture meltdown, The Spinning Head Of Big Prizes (a 'game show' created by the gallery founder Richard Johnson) is held weekly at the gallery. It costs \$1 *not* to play. When not being used for one of our own unusual events (Break Sh*t For Art Night, Poker Night, Bring Your Cat Night), the gallery space is available to rent for other artistic purpose - filming videos, recording bands, the creation of larger art pieces or whatever else you can think of.

KOFU BONSAI KAI

In 1977, a nucleus of bonsai enthusiasts under the leadership of Harry Hirao (*pictured below*), master bonsai teacher, celebrated artist, instructor, demonstrator and collector of bonsai trees from the nearby Sierra Mountains, joined together in forming Kofu Bonsai Kai.

Harry and other members brought other American and Japanese bonsai masters to Orange County to share their bonsai expertise with interested students. These bonsai masters gave workshops and programs to the club members, thus furthering the art of bonsai in Orange County.



Since its origin, Kofu Bonsai Kai has become one of the top ranking bonsai clubs in California with over 200 members who participate in many activities and workshops which the club sponsors.

Kofu Bonsai Kai is a member of the Golden State Bonsai Federation which is a statewide organization of over 70 bonsai clubs. Our members attend and participate in their annual state conventions as well as other statewide bonsai programs.

The club meets monthly (at 7:00 pm on the third Saturday) at the Anaheim United Methodist Church providing bonsai lectures, demonstrations, workshops and beginner classes. At each monthly meeting, bonsai tools, pots and trees are available through a benefit drawing. Often the tree that has been styled by a well known bonsai master is included in the drawing. At 4:00pm (preceding each meeting) a two hour workshop, hosted by club members, is available to members and guests who need assistance with their own trees.

We are privileged to have Harry Hirao as our Founding President. He is a nationally known and respected master. He also participates by providing demonstrations and workshops at various bonsai clubs, exhibitions and conventions throughout the State.

In 1981 he was honored by Prince Takamatsu of Japan with the "Ryoko Hakiju Yukosho" medal for his contributions to the art of bonsai in the United States. He has bonsai trees on exhibit at the U.S. National Bonsai Pavilion in Washington, D.C., The Huntington Library & Botanical Gardens in San Marino, CA., the GSBF Bonsai Collection at Lake Merritt, Oakland, CA., and the Weyerhauser Bonsai Gardens in Washington State.

Club meetings are open to the public. Membership in the club is available for \$20 per individual and \$25 for families. A monthly newsletter is available, and distributed by email. The club website is www://kofukai.org and contains information concerning club activities, exhibits, and other functions as well as photographs of members trees and programs.

On April 11-15, 2012 the California Bonsai Society (CBS) will be presenting their 55th Convention and Bonsai Exhibition at the Anaheim Crown Plaza Resort, 12021 Harbor Blvd. The five surviving original CBS members will be starring with workshops and bonsai demonstrations, and a large bonsai exhibit by CBS club members will also be featured. The exhibit and vendor area will be open to the public (free) while the workshops and demonstrations require registration fees. Our founding President, Harry Hirao is one of the original members of CBS, and will be taking a leading part in this program. Many of our Kofu Kai members are also members of the California Bonsai Society.

We encourage members of the Anaheim Arts Council to visit the CBS Bonsai Exhibit & Convention.

HARP GUILD OF THE PACIFIC SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA: a History

When a fledging orchestra was formed to perform at California State University Fullerton, hopes were high for a full-fledged orchestra in residence in Orange County. Keith Clarke was hired to help organize and conduct the diverse group of musicians. Funds were scarce, but Marcie Mulville had high hopes for the group, and began the daunting task of raising money to keep the group going. She spread the word throughout Orange County, and the effort caught the imagination of Anaheim Piano Teacher Ruth Salaets.

A determined, dedicated woman, Ruth's ongoing motto was "Music is food for the Soul". She heard that guilds to support the orchestra were being formed. She gathered a group of friends and known

music enthusiasts to form a nucleus of prominent women to recruit members and form a guild in Anaheim to raise funds to keep the orchestra going, and to expand it into a cohesive group of expert performers.

Each guild was named for a different musical instrument, and the Anaheim group chose the name "Harp Guild". One of the first meetings was an informal dinner held in the Nuns' quarters of St. Joseph Hospital in Orange.

Following a lively meeting, the group entered the auditorium to hear one of the Orange County Symphony Orchestra's first concerts under the direction of Keith Clark. It was greeted with great enthusiasm, overlooking the somewhat hesitant phrasing of some of the pieces.

Marcie Mulville, Elaine Redfield and of course, Ruth Salaets, took the orchestra under their wings, and these angels of the arts supported the orchestra through many troubled times, raising money and fostering the prestige of the growing ensemble of talented musicians.

The indomitable spirit of Ruth Salaets guided Harp Guild as president through the next seven years, becoming the guiding spirit of the guild to succeed at enviable fund raising through fashion shows, parties at private homes and many other events. Carl and Margaret Karcher, founders of Carl's Jr. restaurants, hosted many of these events in their Anaheim home, as did the late Betty Hughes.

After Ruth turned over the guild to other ambitious members, she returned her devotion to her piano teaching, still keeping a watchful eye on Harp Guild until her death, which saddened not only Harp Guild, but the entire city of Anaheim.

Harp Guild continued on under the leadership of other Anaheim residents until today, when it is small, and struggling, but undergoing a renewal, guided by Dorothea Stephenson and Elsie Reed, charter members, and the new co-presidents Susan Echevarria and Carol Schott.

while raising money for the world class Pacific Symphony Orchestra, now conducted by Carl St. Clair, and based in Santa Ana. The orchestra has found a home at the Orange County Performing Arts Center (now named the Segerstrom Center for the Arts), and its new Music Hall.

Today, Harp Guild is engaged in raising funds for the

orchestra's education program, sending its musicians to elementary schools (Stoddard and Adelaide Price Schools in Anaheim), teaching the teachers and pupils the joys of classical music and its composers (Beethoven is a favorite of the children), and hosting the youngsters at formal concerts at the Music Hall.

Harp Guild is continuing its work, its members celebrating the spirit of founder Ruth Salaets whose motto "Music is food for the Soul" is continuing, a memory not forgotten by a new generation of music lovers.

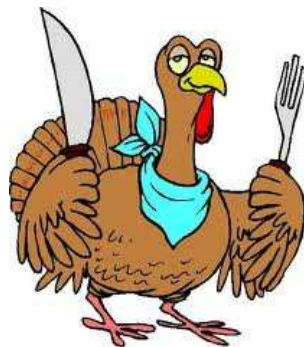
